The Court being duly sworn proceeded to the trial of Patrick M<sup>c</sup> Donald private Soldier in the 47<sup>th</sup> Regm<sup>t</sup> for Desertion.

The Prisoner being asked if he is Guilty or not of the Crime laid to his Charge says he is not Guilty.

The Judge Advocate in support of the Charge calls on the following Evidence

Serj<sup>t</sup> Nicholas Watts of the 47<sup>th</sup> Regm<sup>t</sup> who being duly sworn deposes, that the Prisoner belongs to the same Comp<sup>y</sup> with this Deponent, that on the morning of the 14<sup>th</sup> Ins<sup>t</sup> when the Regm<sup>t</sup> marched from Fort Edward he saw the Prisoner who being employed in the Officer's Mess did not march with the Comp<sup>y</sup>, but followed immediately as this Deponent saw him on the Road, that in the Evening the Prisoner was missing nor did the Deponent hear any thing of him till the Evening of the 16<sup>th</sup>, when he saw him brought to Head Quarters by a Party

of the Brunswick Troops.

Q by the Court. Do you know the Prisoner to have received Pay & Cloathing as a Soldier in the 47<sup>th</sup> Regm<sup>t</sup>?

A. yes, he has received both.

Q by the Court. Do you know any thing of his being Inlisted?

A. No.

Q. by the Court How long has the Prisoner received Pay and Cloathing since the year 1775.

A. I think he joined the Regm<sup>t</sup> in the month of June.

Phillip Walt private Soldier in the Regm<sup>t</sup> of Hess Hanau being duly sworn & Serj<sup>t</sup> John M<sup>c</sup> Kenzie of the 9<sup>th</sup> Regiment being sworn to interpret faithfully, the said Phillip Walt deposes ~~ that he found the prisoner in a Batteau near Kingsborough & brought him to his Brigadier

Q. by Court. On what day did you find the Prisoner.

A I don't know

Q. by Court. Was it after the Army marched from Fort Edward

A yes the Regiment I belong to was left there alone

- Q. by Court. Do you know how long it was after the Army had marched from Fort Edward, that you found the Prisoner.
  - A. I do not recollect
- Q. by Court. How far was the place where you found the Prisoner from the place where the Army was encamped at Fort Edward.
  - A. About half a German league
- Q. by Court. Do you know the Prisoner to be the same Man that you took.
  - A. yes.
  - Q. by Court. How was he dressed
  - A. In his Regimentals as he is now
  - Q. by Court. Had the prisoner his Arms and ~~

## Lawrence Fiderick Private

Soldier in the Regiment of Hesse Hanau being duly sworn and Serj<sup>t</sup> John M<sup>c</sup>Kenzie continuing to Interpret he deposes that he was with Phillip Walt when they took the Prisoner between Kingsborough and the place where the action between our Army and the Rebels passed, that the prisoner was in a batteau & on their calling to him he came out and joined them they asked the Prisoner if he had a pass who began to cry on which they carryed him to the Brigadier.

- Q. by C<sup>t</sup> On what day did you find the Prisoner.
- A. I don't know.
- Q. by C<sup>t</sup> Was it after the Army had marched from Fort Edward?
  - A. I don't know
- Q. by C<sup>t</sup> How far was the place where you found the Prisoner from the place where the Army was encamped at Fort Edward
  - A. a Good German league
- Q. by  $C^t$  Is the Prisoner the same man you took.

A yes.

The Judge Advocate resting the Prosecution on the forgoing Evidence, the Prisoner was put on his defence who says he was in liquor when he went away & did not know where he was going

The Court having maturely considered the Evidence brought by the Judge Advocate in support of the Charge against the Prisoner Patrick M<sup>c</sup>Donald, with what he has said in his Defense, is of Opinion

that

that he is Guilty of Desertion in breach of the first Section of the 6<sup>th</sup> Article of War. The Court does therefore sentence the said Patrick M<sup>c</sup>Donald to receive One thousand Lashes with a Cat of nine Tails at such time and place as his Excellency the Lieu<sup>t</sup> General shall please to appoint.
